FROM THE VICARAGE

What's Wrong With The World?

The story is told that, in 'The Times' newspaper at some point in the early years of the twentieth century, the 'Letters to the Editor' column invited letters on the topic of 'What's Wrong With The World?'

The writer, G K Chesterton apparently sent in a very short letter in reply: "Sir, I am."

I always find that a very sobering story in that, like many people, I find it so easy to see the big things that are wrong with the world, and the mistakes of world leaders, but can sometimes miss the fact that I can be just as guilty of making the same mistakes. The only difference is the magnitude of the consequences. My greed and self-centredness might not have the impact of causing wars between nations or have much impact on the poverty experienced by millions, but they have the same root as the greed and self-centredness of a dictator who lines their own pockets at the expense of the population of their nation - or who covets a neighbouring nations wealth or influence and invades or seeks to destroy it.

Jesus explained such hypocrisy as trying to take a speck of sawdust out of your brother's eye when you have a plank in your own! (Matthew 7.3-5).

Most of this month, we are in the season of Lent. Then we move towards Holy Week and Easter as the month concludes. Have you given up, or cut down on, something for Lent? God revealed to the prophet Isaiah what he wants us to give up - and what he wants us to take up instead:

"Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelterwhen you see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood? Then your light will break forth like the dawn. and your healing will quickly appear; then your righteousness will go before you. and the glory of the Lord will be your rear guard. Then you will call, and the Lord will answer; you will cry for help, and he will say: Here am I. "If you do away with the yoke of oppression, with the pointing finger and malicious talk, and if you spend yourselves on behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed,

It is so easy to 'point the finger' at someone else, but maybe someone else is pointing their finger in my direction - or yours.

then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday." (Isaiah 58.6-10)

The good news for you, me, and even those who are the cause of the biggest problems in the world, is that Jesus allowed all the fingers to be pointed at him. Is this the greatest injustice in history? That the only person who ever lived a totally good and self-less life, had that life cruelly ended by being punished by his own Father - God Almighty - for my sins, your sins and everyone else's sins, past, present and future? Or is it the greatest act of love in eternity? That Jesus freely and willingly chose to take from us the oppressive 'yoke' of sin and death, being the only one who could, as he was the only one who had not earned that yoke for himself.

What's wrong with the world? I am.

What's right with the world? Jesus is.

The proof of this was seen that first Easter morning - the tomb, supposedly the place where the ultimate victory of death was to be seen by the presence of the dead body of Jesus, the Son of God, turned out to be empty apart from the carefully folded graveclothes which had been unable to contain the source of eternal life. Not a tomb that was broken into, but one that had been broken out of, as the power of love and life was shown to be far stronger than the power of hatred and death - so much so that he even had time to leave the place tidy!

So let us all stop pointing the finger at what we see to be the faults of others, and instead let us point our fingers to direct one another closer to the one who has freed us to live life in all its fulness, now and for eternity.




Palm Sunday, 24 March - Holy Saturday, 30 March

An invitation to follow, on boards around the churchyard, or by scanning QR codes around the Pavilions estate, 14 Stations of the Cross which depict the events of Good Friday, with a 15th station added on Holy Saturday, 30 March.


Make a Mother's Day 2024



CTKD GOOD FRIDAY WALK OF WITNESS AND OPEN-AIR SERVICES

The annual CTKD Walk of Witness will take place on Good Friday morning. It consists of four specific sections.

- 1. 9:30am Walk from All Saints, Leek Wootton to St John's, Kenilworth
 - This follows the 9:00am service of All Age Worship. Refreshments are available on our arrival at St. John's. A small cross is carried on this section of the walk. Each walker is encouraged to carry a Palm Cross.
- 2. 10:15am Walk from St. John's, Kenilworth to Abbey End
 This begins the official procession with a group of volunteers carrying the
 large cross. Each walker is encouraged to carry a Palm Cross. This year,
 other converging processions will begin from various different churches.
- **3. 10:45am United Open-Air Service in Abbey End** (*Market Place*) Through scripture, song, drama, testimony, preaching and prayer, the message of Christ on the Cross is proclaimed in the heart of Kenilworth.
- 4. c 11:20am Walk from Abbey End to Abbey Hill
 We enter Abbey Fields by the war memorial and walk to the far end of
 Abbey Hill where the cross is placed in the ground and we share a short time
 of worship and prayer, ending around 11.45am. Refreshments are then
 served in the Church Hall of Abbey Hill United Reformed Church.





Martin Williams, Chairman of the Friends of Coventry Cathedral, writes in his newsletter of the two statues standing in the now large open space in front of the Cathedral. One in place for nearly sixty years and one unveiled just last month.



The oldest, *The Coventry Boy* by Philip Bentham, looks towards the Cathedral, his Apprenticeship Certificate in one hand, a spanner in the other, paying tribute to the industrial engineering heritage prevalent in the city in the 1960s. It was donated by The Coventry Boy Foundation, which was created by one of the city's greatest benefactors, Alfred Harris. Mr Harris was the only benefactor, and The Foundation also funded, amongst other projects, the Graham Sutherland Tapestry, as well as paying for the French

weavers to come over to view their handywork on the eve

of the Consecration in 1962.

The new statue, *The Phoenix Tree* by George Wagstaffe, symbolises the evolution of Coventry and draws on the sculptor's experiences of the Blitz. To him, the sculpture is about rebirth, demonstrating how the city built itself up from ruins and became the City of Peace and Reconciliation. He said "... things do crumble, do fall away, do break up and out of that can come something greater, something good."

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 7 February 2024, at Leek Wootton Village Hall. Discussion included the following:

DEVELOPMENT AT WOODCOTE (POLICE HQ)

The Public Inquiry into the appeal by CALA homes on application W/22/1877 concluded with a final meeting on 4 February 2024 via Zoom. The closing sessions dealt with Conditions and Section 106 agreements and closing statements. The Inquiry was officially closed on 6 February, when CALA submitted its written closing statement.

All parties now await the Planning Inspector's judgement.

LEEK WOOTTON WAR MEMORIAL RECREATION GROUND CAR PARK

Hopefully, the Parish Council will shortly be appointing a contractor to install additional lighting in the car park.

The Parish Environment Group presented its ideas and initial plans for the biodiversity area. To some extent the first year will involve observation of the main meadow area, but planting yellow rattle to limit the grass growth, wildflowers on the edges and naturalised woodland planting in the wooded area will go ahead. There will also be wildlife friendly log piles and a bug hotel. The Scouts will be involved in the project, and if you are interested in being involved, contact environment@leekwootton.org.uk.

RECRUITMENT

The Parish Council is pleased to have had a candidate come forward for one of the three vacancies currently on the Parish Council and hopes to co-opt them at its meeting in March.

DOG WASTE

Dog fouling on the Recreation Ground was discussed and it was agreed that a poster campaign would be useful. The Recreation Ground is a multi-user space, not a dog park, and dog faeces is a hazard to all using the space.

The PC is aware that a number of diligent people pick up after other people's dogs, for which we are very grateful. However, it remains a fact that Leek Wootton has ample provision of dog waste bins, strategically placed for most convenience – please ensure you BAG and BIN your dog's waste or take it home to your own black bin.

TRAFFIC

Hill Wootton Road has once again experienced congestion. This was not notified to the PC in advance, because they were emergency works. WCC Highways has confirmed that National Grid was carrying out emergency works to repair a high voltage cable fault. It appears this was an evolving situation, as only traffic lights were in use, whereas a full road closure may have been more sensible. This route is popular with dog walkers and concerns were expressed to WCC Highways that the closure of the footway caused pedestrians to have to walk in the much reduced carriageway.

Works in March as shown on one.network include:

4-6 Mar Warwick Road (either side of The Elms) – WCC Highways to dig down and investigate gully

24 & 28 Mar Ashow Road (Stoneleigh side of Learnington Road), diversion in place while WCC Highways carries out roadway patching

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE


The PC has had the area where an old tree was felled near the junction of The Meadows and The Hamlet, cleared of weeds and grass seeded – this was a one-off investment by the PC to improve the area, because no other Council or Department would take responsibility. WCC Forestry has also now planted a new tree to replace the old. Hopefully, this will see the area much improved for the neighbouring residents.

The PC is currently tendering for new grounds maintenance contractors.

One comment we have received is that our readers do not really know how the magazine is funded and we have been asked to provide some more information.



The printing cost of each issue varied between £450 and £585 (the number of pages was between 40 and 52 and the number printed was increased in June to include The Pavilions, Kenilworth, which falls within the Church parish).

The mean average cost per household for 10 issues per year is £8.20.

Regarding the Donation Appeal, 2023 saw 153 donations received, which is 26% of the hard copy circulation. Donors were, as always, incredibly generous, giving an average of £17.25 per donation, but when you recalculate this across the number of issues delivered, this equates to £4.46. This income is topped-up with advertising fees.

 Rodgers and Hammerstein's first smash hit. Stage, 1943, Film 1955 starring Gordon MacRae and Shirley Jones on her screen debut. A romance set in Mid-West USA about Cowboys and Cattle Ranchers. 'The Surrey with the Fringe on Top', 'Oh, What a Beautiful Mornin'', 'People Will Say We're in Love', and the title song.



2. Rodgers and Hammerstein's second show. A smash hit on stage (1945) and film (1956). The film again starred Gordon MacRae and Shirley Jones. A tragic romance set in Maine USA. 'June Is Bustin' Out All Over', 'You'll Never Walk Alone', 'If I Loved You'.

- 3. My favourite musical, set in the Paris Riots of 1832. From Victor Hugo's book, the 2012 film had an all-star cast including Hugh Jackman, Russell Crowe, Anne Hathaway and Eddie Redmayne. 'I Dreamed a Dream', 'Bring Him Home', etc.
- 4. Based on another Rodgers and Hammerstein stage show this 1956 film set in 19th Century Siam, starred Yul Bryner and Deborah Kerr. *'Whistle a Happy Tune'*, *'Hello Young Lovers'*, *'Getting to Know You'*, etc.

5. A Lerner and Loewe 1958 romantic film set in the Belle Epoch era in early 20th Century Paris starring Lesley Caron, Louis Jourdain and veteran Maurice Chevalier. 'Thank Heaven for Little Girls', 'I Remember it Well' and the title song.

6. This 1950 stage play and 1955 film which starred Frank Sinatra, Marlon Brando as Skye Masterson and Jean Simmons, with music and lyrics by Frank Loesser was set in New York's gambling community. 'Luck be a Lady', 'Sit Down, You're Rockin' the Boat' and 'If I Were A Bell'.

7. Smash hit of 2017 this musical starred Hugh Jackman, Zac Efron and Rebecca Ferguson. Set in America's early 20th Century showbiz scene it's a loose biography of P.T. Barnum of circus fame. 'It's Me' and 'Never Enough' sung by Loren Allred.

8. 1967 'Flower Power' Broadway hit, probably the first Rock Musical. It's theme of sex drugs and rock n roll, anti-Vietnam War and nudity caused a sensation when first released. 'Aquarius', 'I Got Life' and 'Good Morning Starshine'.

9. This Andrew Lloyd Webber musical premiered in

London in 1981 and on Broadway a year later and was a smash hit in both. It was based on a poem by T.S. Eliot. The Song 'Memory' sung by Elaine Paige rocketed her to stardom. The original 1981 cast also featured Wayne Sleep, Sarah Brightman and Bonnie Langford.

- 10. This Lerner and Loewe 1951(stage)and 1969 (film) was set in the time of the California Gold Rush. The Film starred Lee Marvin, Clint Eastwood and Jean Seaberg. 'I Talk to the Trees' and 'Wand'rin' Star' (Marvin).
- 11. Andrew Lloyd Webber / Tim Rice musical following the life and death of a South American dictator's wife first staged in 1978 in the West End. Originally starring Elaine Paige and David Essex. 'Don't Cry for Me Argentina' and 'You Must Love Me'.
- 12. This musical, adapted from a 1920's cartoon character was first staged on Broadway in 1977 and the West End in 1978. It tells of a little orphan girl's search for happiness from an orphanage to being adopted by a millionaire. 'It's The Hard Knock Life' and 'Tomorrow'.

Seed Planting for Children



Snapdragons, cosmos and sweet peas are great for children to grow, they have multiple flower stems per plant and come in a variety of colours. Ideal for picking later in the season.

Yogurt pots are perfect for starting plants off. Add drainage holes in the bottom and leave on warm windowsill. Plant out in the garden

once the frosts have passed.

Sweet peas can also be grown in empty toilet rolls and once the first leaves have formed, transferred straight into the garden soil, the cardboard will decompose. Only plant out when the risk of frost has passed.

AVON WOOD Join our Woodland Journey



Avon Wood is a project to create a new biodiverse woodland in the parish. Situated off the B4115, the 32-acre site is a former agricultural field bordering the river (see www.avon-wood.co.uk). 18,000 native broadleaf saplings were planted five years ago and are now well established, and there is ample evidence of nature reclaiming the site. 40+ species of birds and 12 of butterfly have been catalogued, and foxes, badgers, otters and deer are regular visitors.



CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS

The next phase of the project will need broader involvement from the community, firstly to help with basic maintenance - the plan is to schedule days when groups of volunteers can tackle tasks ranging from collecting redundant deer guards, to re-staking wind damaged saplings, and in due course planting bluebells.

Secondly, we're also looking for specialist help, naturalists to fully catalogue flora and fauna and to document how soil and food chains are recovering, and educationalists who can turn such data into learning materials and experiences, particularly for younger generations.



Kenilworth Probus I met for its regular meeting at the Sports Club on Tuesday, 20 February. The first item was one minute of silence in memory of a member, Brian Williams, who passed away unexpectedly earlier this month. After a short amount of house business, attention turned to the speaker's talk which was entitled "Orthodontics - The Science of Moving Teeth".

Barry Hayes a recently retired Orthodontist and Lecturer at Warwick University briefly related his career, including the five years to qualify as a dentist followed by three further years to qualify as an orthodontist. He then talked of the history and indications of attempts to move teeth having been found from archaeological digs of ancient Egyptian, Greek and Roman sites. He also illustrated attempts made by the French in the 17th and 18th Centuries using leather, but nothing further had been tried until the modern methods we know today from the 1970s. His talk then moved to the way an orthodontist operates, how moving teeth is limited to 1mm per month, how the wires are fixed to teeth and how the tensions required to move the teeth are estimated.

It was a most interesting and educational talk, well received by the members.

The Club next meets on Tuesday, 19 March when Hazel Carter will be talking about "Living with Motor Neurone Disease. Life's Good - it's the disease that's the problem". The April meeting will be the Club's AGM.

GCWG 10th Anniversary

In January 2014, a team of 30 volunteers turned up on a bitterly cold but sunny day, to start the task of returning Guy's Cliffe Walled Garden to its former glory. It had been a working kitchen garden for the Guy's Cliffe estate (family home of the Greatheed family) from the 1760s until the mid-1940s. In more recent years the garden had formed part of Hintons Nursery but prior to new ownership of the nursery it had fallen into dereliction.

Now, the garden is producing lots of fruit and vegetables again, this time for local food charities. Not always an easy task, but the volunteers and the charities have become a strong team.

Jude, one of the lead caterers at the local night shelter, said: "We really appreciate the regular donations of fresh produce we get. Our guests may occasionally be a bit wary of some of the things we give them, but we've also had a lot of converts to roasted squash and parsnips!"

The main aims of the Garden are to honour its original horticultural purpose and to develop it for community and educational benefit. Currently work is progressing to restore the impressive glass peach house, while other volunteers are preparing for another busy season growing and picking fruit, vegetables and flowers.

The garden is open throughout the year, and in 2024 will be co-hosting World Bee Day, when there will be a range of activities, refreshments and stalls as well a great display by Warwick and Leamington Beekeepers.


