Community (a)Live




Another Olympics is over, and the baton has been passed on to Los Angeles for 2028. Speaking of batons, the saddest moment of the Olympics for me was in the last track event, after the second Jamaican athlete in the 4x400m relay dropped the baton, after a

moment of carelessness when she hit it against another athlete. I say,

'after' rather than 'when', because it was the third athlete in the team who I really felt for - she never even got the chance to start, let alone finish. She just stood there beside the track, watching all the others go past, knowing that the all important baton was never going to come to her, or to her other teammate.

I suppose the idea of 'passing on the baton' is in the forefront of my mind as my retirement at the end of January approaches. I don't know what will happen once I leave - but I really want to make sure that I hand the baton on well, to give the All Saints 'team' the best chance of future success.



Through much of this year, we've been thinking in our acts of Sunday worship about the teaching of Jesus in the Bible where he told his disciples that they should 'Love one another' - but beyond this, he set the bar very high (to use another athletics metaphor): "As I have loved you, so you should love one another"! That is self-sacrificial, costly love.

Fortunately, there are many more 'one another' passages in the Bible which help to unpack what it means to love one another to this standard, and we have been thinking about different phrases, week by week, for the past couple of months and will continue to do so through September and October.

Our September themes really focus on our life as a community, which fits well with the Parish Council's *Community Live!* event. In particular, that same weekend, we will be thinking of the call to 'Encourage One Another'.

One of the joys of having lived and served in this parish for these past 16 years has been the strong sense of community. There has been something really special about Leek Wootton because of it. Yet there is always the danger of this really special part of our village life being lost as the years go on, and the life of every resident will be much poorer if this happens.

For generations, new residents have taken their place in community life and maintained that special character. They've received the baton from those who have faithfully carried community leadership and run with it. The *Leek Wootton Link* seeks to highlight the many opportunities for community activity, and *Community Live!* will do the same. It deserves to have a MASSIVE turnout from the people of this parish - young and old, and those somewhere in between. Not only might you find something to interest you, but you might find a challenge to

get more involved so that this community may continue to flourish into the future. Maybe you will notice a 'gap in the market' of community events that you and others could get together to try and fill by beginning something new.

Continuing excerpts from

COVENTRY CAMEOS by Eric Benjamin Bramwell, 1977:

"A Benedictine monastery, to house an abbot and twenty-four monks, was founded in 1043 by Leofric, Earl of Mercia, and his countess Godiva, on land to the north of the present Priory Row.*

The abbey church of the monastery was so richly decorated with gold, silver and precious stones that it was said the walls were too narrow to contain all the treasure. Early writers claimed that it was without equal in the whole of England.



Externally, all that is known is that it had two porches, under one of which the Earl of Leofric was buried in 1057**. Afgar, Loefric's son, is stated to be interred within the church. Godiva, who died in 1067 was also buried there. There is no doubt that Coventry began its rise to prominence from the founding of Leofric and Godiva's monastery and abbey church.

After the Conquest, the bishopric of this part of the Midlands was transferred from Lichfield to Chester and, in 1102, Bishop Robert de Limesey, having obtained the authority of the Pope, moved his stall from Chester to the abbey church of Coventry. Bishop Limesey, and subsequent bishops of the diocese, whether living in Coventry or Lichfield, now became head of the monastery; and its working superior was given the title of Prior of the Benedictine Monastery attached to the cathedral church. Thus, the abbey church of Godiva became Coventry's first Cathedral."

- * Consequently, Coventry was, for nearly three hundred years, divided into two halves, one as the 'Prior's Half' and one as the 'Earl's Half'.

The Parish Council met on Wednesday, 3 July 2024 (the eve of the General Election), at Leek Wootton Village Hall. Discussion included the following:

NEW WEB AND EMAIL ADDRESSES

Parish Councils nationwide are being encouraged to adopt .gov.uk domains and Leek Wootton & Guy's Cliffe PC has been looking into combining this with improving the organisation of its IT. The website leekwootton.org.uk was purchased in 2000 and has also been the Clerk's email since then. In 2018 Councillors' email addresses were set up with a different provider using the lwandgc-parishcouncil.co.uk domain. These email addresses and the website are now brought together in the new domain:

leekwoottonandguyscliffeparish.gov.uk

Being a government purchased/sanctioned domain we were not allowed to use the PC's initials, hence the long address. Emails sent to the old addresses will be forwarded and the old website will redirect automatically.

DEVELOPMENT AT WOODCOTE (POLICE HQ)

At the time of the ordinary Parish Council meeting the PC was still awaiting a detailed planning application from CALA Homes (Cotswolds). This arrived on 29 July with a consultation period running until 19 August. The PC & Leek Wootton Focus Group [LWFG] promptly organised a Community Meeting at All Saints' Church on 4 August, which was well attended despite it being in the middle of the summer break.

The Parish Council, along with LWFG, was invited to a meeting with CALA to present the application and had the opportunity to ask questions. The PC also held an Extraordinary PC Meeting on 15 August at the Church to discuss the application and decide on the Parish Council's response. This, and all responses, may be viewed online at http://planningdocuments.warwickdc.gov.uk/ (Application No. W/24/1006).

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone who came to the Community Meeting and has taken the time to submit responses to the consultation, especially in the middle of the holiday season!

The Parish Council has now also submitted a claim for costs to Warwick District Council in relation to the Planning Inquiry, which led to the granting of permission for outline planning permission in May.

COMMUNITY RIGHT TO BID / ASSETS OF COMMUNITY VALUE

Community organisations have the right to identify assets they believe are of

value to their community and nominate them to be listed on the District Council's Register of Assets of Community Value. (https://www.warwickdc.gov.uk/info/20599/community_and_social_issues/448/community_right_to_bid)

The Anchor Inn had previously been registered and has now been renewed for 5 years, with the PC agreeing that it should be renewed on an ongoing basis. Should the property come onto the open market in the future, the community will have six months to explore public interest in raising the capital to purchase it and run it.

In addition, other assets in the community that may benefit from being similarly listed were discussed and considered for possible future addition.

LEEK WOOTTON WAR MEMORIAL RECREATION GROUND CAR PARK

The visibility of the bay markings in the car park has been an issue for a year now and the PC has been investigating possible methods for improvement. A contrasting white gravel, with some reflective properties, is being used to improve visibility of the markings, which will also help with night-parking.

PLANNING ISSUES

The Parish Council raised an issue with Warwick District Council's Planning Enforcement and The Warwickshire about the appearance of the new 'Strike Shack'. Situated west of the Clubhouse and car park in the centre of the golf course, planning permission was sought and granted for a new covered driving range, with conditions that would ensure it was sympathetic to its location in the heart of the greenbelt. However, in July a temporary structure was observed from the footpath near Stone Edge, with green 'canvas' and extremely large white letters proclaiming STRIKE SHACK. The PC felt this was not appropriate and, following investigation, the Enforcement Officer requested removal of the lettering, but the temporary structure could remain for

the 'life' of the granted full planning permission (planning applications require work to begin within 3 years of the date of permission, which in this case was 17 February 2023).

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE

The PC continues to pursue several community maintenance issues with the District Council and, in the case of Highways, the County Council. We have had a mostly dry August, but the rain will surely return, and when it does the PC will be observing and where necessary reporting any issues with surface water drainage.

The PC has received confirmation that both the beech hedges on Woodcote Lane and ivy overhanging the pavement near the Anchor would be cut back after the bird-nesting season was over. However, as a general rule, occupants of properties are responsible for ensuring that hedges, trees and vegetation do not encroach onto the public highway (roads or footpaths) outside their properties. Now that the bird-nesting season is over, the PC would reiterate its comments made in the July issue of the *Link* about sightlines and overgrown pedestrian footways which are also increasingly an issue.

- Pedestrians should be able to walk on pavements and footpaths, without having to duck and dodge bushes and branches – ideally a double buggy should be able to pass.
- Hedges near junctions may also affect sightlines for drivers using those junctions.
- Trees may obscure street lighting.
- Falling leaves or wilting plants on footpaths will begin to cause hazards as we approach the autumn, when wet weather may contribute to make walking surfaces slippery.

PLEASE take a moment to stop and look at your property from the public highway (including pavement) and consider whether you could improve pedestrian and vehicular access.

DRIVERS PLEASE also take a moment to consider pedestrians when parking – ensure there is enough room for them to walk safely on the pavement - ideally a double buggy should be able to pass.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be at 7:30pm on Wednesday, 4 September 2024, at Leek Wootton Village Hall.

Sue Wood was adopted as a baby into a loving and happy family in Welford on Avon and she enjoyed village life - fêtes, fancy dress, maypole dancing et al. Schooling was in Stratford and then at King's High in Warwick before college in Leicester where she trained to be a Home Economics teacher. She only held one teaching position, but her pleasure and her passion for cooking were well and truly fulfilled when catering for the many friends that Sue

made and kept throughout her life. With her husband, Richard, and their two daughters she first lived in Bedfordshire but when they returned to Warwickshire, to Haseley and then Kites Nest Farm in Beausale, they joined Ladies Circle and Round Table respectively, and embraced a new circle of friends through the church, school and wider community.

Richard died in 2015 very shortly after their Golden Wedding anniversary and Sue moved to Leek Wootton where she could be near to friends and to The Warwickshire where she was a constant at its aqua classes. Sue had long term health issues, and she loved those aqua classes as well as the friends and social life that the Club afforded her. She was a regular at All Saints', latterly attending services via Zoom.

Parish Council Update on the **Woodcote Development**

With the success of its Appeal, it was with some surprise that the Parish Council learnt that CALA Homes had submitted yet another new application W/24/1006, this time for 70 homes on the paddock and tennis courts on the Woodcote estate.

Whilst it was pleasing to see the reduction in numbers, there were nevertheless continuing issues with the size and spacing of garages, the number and positioning of visitor parking spaces and the number of trees and hedges being retained or removed. The Parish Council therefore objected to the application.

However, the Council has been determined to keep a dialogue going and meetings with representatives from CALA have taken place where our concerns have been voiced. CALA in turn has stated its awareness of the sensitivity of the development and pledged to work co-operatively with us. This will be particularly pertinent during the construction phase when there will be maximum noise, dust and traffic inconvenience. The PC has also been in touch with the WDC Enforcement Officer who said it was particularly important to make sure CALA met all building pre-commencement conditions. CALA has said it recognises the importance of liaising with us during these phases.

There is further concern over the part of The Lunch woodland which has been granted to CALA by the Police on a 999-year lease to provide the recreational space for the new development. In theory, along with other open spaces in the development, this area will be tended and looked after by a management committee of new residents. Each new home will be subject to a levy to pay for this. In practice it is recognised that this scheme could be fraught with complications, not least the size of the levy and how it would increase year on vear.

This brings into focus the rest of the woodland still owned by the Police. The PC sees an opportunity now to engage in a wider conversation with both the Police and the District Council over this precious and pristine environment and how it can be enhanced and protected on into the future. We look forward to setting up meetings in the autumn.



KENILWORTH PROBUS I CLUB

After some brief Club business at our July meeting, we had a talk by Richard Clifford from Kenilworth Probus 2 entitled "HS2 Construction". His interest in HS2 began during the first lockdown (Spring 2020), when he would see the work going on whilst cycling along the Kenilworth Greenway.

He opened his talk by stating that he is not involved with HS2 and is neither for nor against the project. He asked for a show of hands on the feeling of his audience to the project, which resulted in a heavy vote against.

He then explained that as he hadn't flown his drone for a while, he thought it would be the perfect opportunity to view the workings from above, the results of which he started posting on YouTube, and he now have several hundred 'followers'.

He explained the history of the railways from West Midlands to London, how the project has been scaled back by governments, how the cost compares with other large railway projects, why it is so expensive and showed drone pictures of the construction works and maps of the project. It is now only some 140miles long and 62 miles will be in various tunnels. When complete it is likely to reduce services on other existing routes to facilitate freight movements.

The talk ended with a further test of opinions but there were no changes, it is still not popular with our members. To see the videos taken by Richard Clifford search: HS2 videos Mark Thrushton

On 23 July a party of members enjoyed a visit to Church Farm Brewery at Budbrook.

Our August meeting was at LWSC as usual on the 20th of the month. Again, the meeting began with brief Club business and then moved on to the talk by David Morse entitled "1816 The Year Without a Summer". This dealt with the catastrophic effects of the eruption of Mount Tambora in Indonesia in 1815. This volcanic eruption was so enormous that the top of the mountain was reduced from about 4,300 to 2,850 metres (14,110 to 9,350 feet). The heavy volcanic ash particles buried houses, people (at least 71,000), crops etc. over a wide area, and the explosion was heard more than 1,600 miles away. Due to microscopic particles being thrown high into the upper atmosphere the global climate in the

northern hemisphere was affected, and the temperatures in the summer of 1816 in Europe were the coldest of any on record between 1766 and 2000, resulting in crop failures and major food shortages with riots and famine becoming common. There were snow falls in eastern North America in the summer months causing crop failures and people moved in search of better farming opportunities, contributing to westward expansion.

The atmospheric changes are said to have led to some of the skies in W H Turner's paintings and authors writing dark fiction such as Mary Shelley's Frankenstein

LEEK WOOTTON HEDGEHOGS

It's been a while since I managed to get time to write anything for the magazine and it's just a brief one this time. My hog rescue has been extremely busy again this year and numbers have already surpassed those from last year. The mixed weather over the year so far has given us, and the hogs, different challenges. The hogs have struggled with the wet weather and the lack of good food sources. It really seems like the insect population has dwindled over the last few years.

I have also experienced a very high number of nests disturbed by dogs. Fortunately, most of the hoglets were found with mum present. However, one mum had only given birth the night before and I was extremely worried that she would reject her 5 babies due to the stress of being disturbed and being moved, but with some peace and quiet, she took them back and they are now almost 5 weeks old. I have had to convert my outside hutches into a maternity wing!

As Autumn approaches and you tend to your gardens or communal areas, please consider leaving an undisturbed

corner, a messy corner in a quiet, shaded spot. It's not just hogs that will benefit, but also frogs, newts and lots of insects. Log piles are a fantastic idea too.

If you want to check your hog houses, now is a good time to do it and you might want to take the chance to clean them out as long as they're not occupied! Please just use hot soapy water or an animal safe (not household) disinfectant. You can fill them with dry barley straw afterwards. Watch out for tick nests in the hog houses. If you find one, then boiling water is the best way to kill them. Please avoid squishing them, leaving their remains can contaminate the area.

Halloween and Bonfire Night are on the horizon. Please make sure you recycle any pumpkins in the garden recycling bins rather than in the garden. Eating a large amount of vegetable matter can cause a hog to have extremely bad tummy problems and can quickly kill them.

I know not many people have bonfires in their gardens these days, but if you

do, please check for wildlife at the base before you light it.

Remember, if you find a hog out in the day 'it's not OK' – please contact me or one of the Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue team. You should act quickly if the



hog is wobbly, being pestered by flies or birds, sunbathing or if they are injured or looking thin (a dipped neck or shaped like a rugby ball rather than a football).

Please continue to support hogs with a shallow dish of water and where possible, some kitten or hedgehog biscuits.

Big Butterfly Count Results 2024

The counting took place between 12 July and 4 August. Thank you to all those parish members who took part in our second annual survey.

Fifteen counts from the parish were submitted to the UK 's Butterfly Conservation Group.

Fourteen different species were seen with a total of 101 butterflies counted.

This is down from last year when a total of 146 butterflies were counted. The unusually wet spring may have accounted for the drop. As our weather becomes more erratic it is important we do all we can to nurture and support our butterfly populations.

This years top parish butterflies were the Large White (23) and the Peacock (18).

The Large White caterpillars feed on wild or cultivated species of the Cruciferae or Cabbage family and the Peacock caterpillars feed on the Common Nettle.
